REPORT ON THE PART PLAYED BY THE 15TH BATTN. DURHAM LIGHT INFANTRY IN THE ATTACK MADE BY THE 64TH INFANTRY BRIGADE ON THE HINDENBURG LINE ON APRIL 9-10, 1917.

BATTALION OBJECTIVES

The objectives allotted to the Battalion were as follows:-FIRST OBJECTIVE. German front line and communication trenches from T.4.b.9.72 to N. 34.d. 3.8

German support trenches from N.35.c.3.4. to N.34.b.7.22 SECOND OBJECTIVE.

COMPANY OBJECTIVES

Objectives given to Companies were:"C" and "D" Coys to take the First Battalion Objective The and to form the first wave.
"B" and "A" Coys to take the Second Battalion Objective and to form the second wave.

3. ASSEMBLY.

Shortly after midnight April 8/9, the attacking Companies were in their assembly trenches in T.4.c and T.3. the boundaries of which had been previously marked by the Brigade Staff, the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt. and the 9th K.O.Y.L.I. on our left. The 9th K.O.Y.L.I. were not however occupying their assembly trenches but were in the sunken road in rear.
My right Company Commanders, Capts. Thorpe and Cartman, were instructed to get in touch with the left Company Commanders of the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt. and to work in close co-operation with them. My left Company Commanders, Lieuts. Saunders and Hall, had similar orders as regards the right Company Commanders of the 9th K.O.Y.I.I. As these companies were not in the same the 9th K.O.Y.I.I. As these companies were not in the same trenches, the liaison was more difficult.

THE ADVANCE TO THE ASSAULT.

At 3.45 p.m., April 9th, "C" and "D" Coys left their assembly trenches and advanced to the assault in lines of sections in file followed at 200 yards distance by "B" and "A" Coys in the same formation. "A" Coys in the same formation.
Owing to the advance being made in close co-operation with
the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt., all companies set off at the
same minute and during the advance it was impossible to
distinguish where the junction of the two regiments was.
"B" and "A" Coys halted on reaching the line of the sunken
road N.34.c.5.2 to T.4.b.4.5, until red flares could be seen
burning in front, this being a pre-arranged signal to warn
them that the first objective had been secured. On the red
flares being lighted, "B" and "A" Coys continued their
advance. advance. Very few casualties were incurred during the advance to the assault.

THE ASSAULT.

"C" and "D" Coys had very little difficulty in taking their objectives and "C" Coy got in touch with the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt. on their right at once. This touch was maintained until the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt. were driven back on the night of the 10th April.

5. THE ASSAULT Contd.

O.C. "D" Coy, being unable to obtain connection with the 9th K.O.Y.L.I. on his left, personally took charge of a bombing party and bombed his way some 300 yards to his left along that part of the enemy's front line which formed part of the First Objective of the 9th K.O.Y.L.I. At this point, however, he ran short of bombs and was forced to withdraw to his own part of the line.

This Officer states that had he had sufficient bombs he would have been able to silence the German machine gun which was holding up the advance of the 9th K.O.Y.L.I.

6. THE ASSAULT. (Second Objective).

On "C" and "D" Coys securing their objective, "B" and "A" Coys continued their advance and when passing through the gaps in the German wire came under a very heavy barrage and the attacking lines became somewhat dis-organised, but the first German trench was entered. This proved to be very wide and difficult to cross which caused further disorganisation of the second wave and necessitated a re-arrangement which was not easy owing to Companies being mixed up.

Meanwhile, Capt. Cartman, who was in command of the second wave, received information that the 9th K.O.Y.L.I. had not reached the first objective and that the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt. were not proceeding to the second objective, and a patrol under 2nd Lieut. Williams which had been sent forward to examine the wire in front of the second objective, reported it as being very strong and quite uncut by our artillery - also that it was under enfilade machine gun fire from the left. Very few men of this patrol returned. Capt. Cartman then got into touch with an Officer of the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt. and after discussing the advisability of a further advance, decided that the situation, being what it was, a further advance was impossible until further artillery fire had been brought to bear on the enemy(s support line and the wire in front of it and he sent me a message to this effect.

7. CONSOLIDATION OF CAPTURED POSITIONS.

As soon as the first objective was secured, the work of consolidation began.

Owing to the shortage of bombs a hostile bombing party was able to make considerable progress on the left flank and succeeded in turning out a large number of "A" and "D" Coys f from the ground gained. On receiving a message to this effect, I sent a message to Capt. Thorpe, O.C. "C" Coy, instructing him to take command of the firing line and to collect the remnants of the other Companies and form and hold a strong point from N.34.d.7½.l to T.4.b.9½.7.

Shortly after that, I received a telephone message from General Headlam, Commanding 64th Infantry Brigade, instructing me to act in the way that I had already done. Shortly after this I received a written message from Capt. Thorpe to the effect that he had carried out my orders and that he felt confident about his position but that he considered that the men should be relieved as soon as possible. B.G.C. 64th Infantry Brigade informed me that I would receive three platoons of the loth K.O.Y.L.I. as a reinforcement and these men arrived. Capt. Thorpe informed me that with the addition of the reinforcement from the loth K.O.Y.L.I. his line was too thickly manned. I accordingly ordered him to withdraw men to the shell-holes in the enemy wire to act as a support to himself in case of counter-attack, and, at the same time, to commance digging a communication trench to connect his strong point with the sunken read in T.4.a.

8. ENEMY COUNTER-ATTACKS.

At about 5 a.m. on the morning of April 10th, the enemy made a very determined bombing attack on my left flank and for 1½ hours a hard fight was in progress. At 6.30 a.m. the enemy was driven off and things were quiet. At about 3 p.m. information from R.F.C. was received to the effect that the German trenches on our left were unoccupied. I instructed Capt. Thorpe to send out an officer's patrol to ascertain if this was so. At 3.15 p.m. 2nd Lieut. Davies with a bombing squad proceeded past the block and along the trench to the left. He had not gone more than 50 yards when he encountered strong bodies of the enemy and was forced to return to our own line. At about 3.40 p.m. the enemy attempted another counterattack on my left flank. Thus however only lasted about 20 minutes and the enemy did not succeed in penetrating our line.

9. THE WITHDRAWAL.

At about 7.15 p.m. some bombing was heard on my right and the 1st Bn. E. Yorks. Regt. were seen to be withdrawing to the line of the sunken road and the men of the E. Yorks. on our immediate right started to run into our trench. An attempt was made by us to hold up the German attack but we were unable to do so and Capt. Thorpe ordered a withdrawal to the sunken road trenches and sent me a runner informing me of this. I immediately sent him an order to make a counter-attack and consolidate a smaller portion of the enemy's line than he had had before. Col. Postlewhite of the 10th K.O.Y.L.I.who were holding the sunken road, ordered him not to counter-attack as he had received instructions from 64th Infantry Brigade to this effect.

Capt. Thorpe thereon handed over to Capt. Cartman and came back to Battn. Headquarters and informed me as to the situation. I then collected all the spare men at Battn. H.Q. and sent them forward with ammunition and bombs under Lieut. Herbert, the Lawis Gun Officer. I was then ordered by 64th Infantry Brigade to withdraw to the second line assembly trench where I went and found that only 211 Officers and men were left. The spirit of the men was pplandid and they were all eager to counter-attack.

On returning to Battn. Headquarters I received orders to take my Battalion to BOISLEUX-ST-MARC as soon as the O.C. 1st Bn. Lincoln Regt. was satisfied as to the situation. The Battalion marched off from the HENIN-CROISILLES road at about midnight on night April 10/11.

OBSERVATIONS.

- 1. If the attacking troops had had a larger supply of bombs in hand, I think that things would have gone differently and we might have been able to enable the 9th K.O.Y.L. to reach their first objective.
- 2. Our snipers did excellent work but there were not enough of them to compete with the enemy snipers and our losses from sniping after the attack was made were considerable.
- 3. A great number of rifle grenades were used by us and were found to be invaluable owing to the fact that the German could outthrow us with his egg and stick bombs.
- 4. I consider that Dayfield body shields would have saved a number of casualties among our bombers.

- 5. The communication trench which was dug back to the line of the sunken road undoubtedly saved thelives of many runners and stretcher-bearers.
- 6. The ladder line system of telephone wire proved very effective and communication was maintained between Bettelion Headquarters and O.C. firing line without any great difficulty.

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



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
